This video video idea extends into the domain of social media, particularly platforms like Facebook, which can amplify existing political divides by tailoring content based on user profiles and interests.

The authors conducted research to explore whether political homophily in Southeast Europe relates to individuals' experiences of war, examining social networks and how people's views on the war influence their social connections. Their findings suggest that individuals are more likely to form ties with others who share similar perspectives on war, and that experiences of trauma from war affect social interactions. Veterans tend to have larger networks compared to civilians, while refugees often experience social isolation due to the disconnection from their communities.

The study utilized a novel approach, combining qualitative and quantitative research methods, including an online survey administered through Facebook to gather detailed data on demographics, political opinions, and war experiences. While the research sheds light on the impact of historical conflicts on contemporary social networks, it acknowledges limitations, such as relying on self-reported data and the challenges of establishing causality.

The key implications highlight that opinions about historical conflicts shape present social relations and that understanding these dynamics is crucial for fostering reconciliation in post-conflict societies. The research emphasizes the significance of shared historical narratives in influencing current social connections and underlines the challenges and potential for building empathy between diverse communities in post-war environments.
