Throughout this process, the systemic racism present in the legal system and broader society in Canada is highlighted, showcasing the backlash faced by Justice Sparks.

Despite challenges, Rodney found relief and became an advocate in his community, while Judge Sparks faced professional repercussions and increased isolation. Her legacy evolved as she became an icon in the black community, advocating for diversity in the judiciary.
