The author aims to produce a book that highlights how Malawian migrants have influenced cultures and societies beyond their country's borders, particularly during the colonial and post-colonial periods.

The research incorporates both colonial archival studies and oral history interviews with returned migrants, capturing their personal stories and the broader socio-economic dynamics at play. The author notes that most historical accounts of migration highlight movements to South Africa, whereas migrations to Zimbabwe have been more common among Malawians.

The discussion spans multiple aspects, including the historical context of Malawi as a British colony, the nature of labor migration, and the challenges and opportunities faced by Malawian migrants. It also addresses how migrants maintained connections to their home communities, the pressures this created, and the economic contributions they made through remittances.

Women's migration is also highlighted, detailing how many women sought better opportunities away from rural constraints. This video emphasizes the need to understand the historical continuities in migration patterns in Africa and the resulting socio-political impacts, as well as the evolving challenges faced by diasporic communities, particularly in relation to citizenship rights in post-colonial contexts.
