This video video discusses the relationship between art, imagination, and history, exploring how visual evidence—such as art and architecture—can deepen our understanding of the past and challenge established historical narratives. A key focus is the role of artists, who may not only record history but also create it, highlighted through a discussion of the Tudor artist Hans Holbein and the impact of his portraits on historical perception, particularly of Henry VIII.

The conversation then shifts to the work of New Zealand artist Lisa Reihana, specifically her exhibition "The Pursuit of Venus Infected." This video video work is a digital reinterpretation of 19th-century wallpaper that reflects European exploration in the Pacific. Reihana's piece challenges traditional historical narratives by incorporating authentic representations of Pacific Islander cultures and experiences, capturing a perspective often overlooked in historical texts and accounts.

Further, the text references historical artists like Francisco Goya, who embodied the role of the artist as historian through their powerful depictions of significant events, allowing audiences to connect emotionally with history.
