It emphasizes the need for tailored support mechanisms that address specific local dynamics rather than a one-size-fits-all solution.

The overarching message advocates for understanding and supporting communities rather than viewing them as problematic, stressing the importance of building local resilience while addressing the needs for external support and intervention.
