Steve Johnson, an academic specializing in entrepreneurial studies, argues that the impact of entrepreneurship research on society may be greater than measurable evidence suggests, yet this also opens up the possibility that the research could have had little to no impact. This video highlights the non-linear and messy relationship between academic research and policy, suggesting that this ambiguity can offer a shield against accountability.

Examples are provided through evaluations of initiatives like the ESRC policy fellows, where academics added value by asking critical questions and contributing to broader systemic improvements in government departments. The author argues for more reflection on the implications of co-production and promotes research leadership as a critical area for development, particularly regarding its impact on equality, diversity, inclusion, and mental health within academic settings. Overall, the text calls for a rethinking of how research is conducted and supported, focusing on maintaining academic independence amidst external pressures.
